# Getting to Know... Opal Doerr

*Opal Doerr has been attending St. Mark's on the Campus for thirteen years. She is involved in many ministries, including editing this newsletter. She has also serve as a coffee host, as a member of the altar guild, lector, and one of the junior/senior high Sunday school teachers. And, as if that weren't enough, every week Opal tidies the kitchen and waters the parish plants! Thanks, Opal! And thanks also for taking the time to answer these questions.*

## **Please tell me a little bit about your family:**

Eric and I met in 1982 at a hobby activity which I'm likely to explain more about later. We married in the fall of 1984, and that same fall he started as a non-traditional student at UNL in the College of Engineering. I had graduated from the College of Architecture with a Bachelor of Science in 1976 and had a job with the City Urban Development Department. Eric completed his degree in Electrical Engineering in 1988 and began working for Lincoln Telephone Company the next year. Our first son, Arthur, was born in 1990 and our second son, Oliver, was born in 1993. Eric and I still work at our same jobs... although my job title and his company's name have each changed a few times. In these times of people moving from job to job so often, we know this makes us unusual.

## **What are you most proud of about each of your children?**

Among his friends, I've seen Arthur be the peace-maker and consensus builder. He looks out for little kids and, yes, his "little" brother... sometimes to the disgust of said brother! When Arthur reads he focuses completely. Of course, when he's playing games on the Play Station, he focuses completely, too. He's a good kid...and he'll be a Junior at Lincoln High this fall – my,

how time has flown! Come to a football game at Beechner and you'll probably see him in the pep band and, if there's a half time show, he'll be marching! As much as he grumps about practicing on his clarinet, he really loves band and the "band community" at Lincoln High.

Oliver will be in the 8th Grade at Irving Middle School this fall. He's mostly a loner, largely due to his situation as a "special needs kid." It is difficult for him to find friends from his own age group. He manages pretty well as a main-streamed Special Ed student and gets along with his classmates, but communication and emotional development levels are an issue. However, in spite of his obstacles, Oliver is generally an upbeat kind of guy. He loves learning all sorts of details – including details about the people he sees at church.

## **Where did you grow up and/or go to school?**

I grew up on a farm in north central Nebraska, near the small town of Stuart. My father died when I was six, but my mother managed, with the help of my uncle, to keep the farm. My older sister and brother and I all helped with chores – from chickens to cows, vegetable garden to hayfield, and dish-washing to canning, there was plenty of work for everyone.

My first school years were in one-room country schools, which I've been told is an experience that is somewhat unique to Nebraska. However, even then school districts were being consolidated.

## **Where is the most interesting or exciting place you've lived?**

I haven't lived outside of Nebraska. I've lived in Lincoln for 34 years where I've lived with roommates, alone, in apartments, duplexes and houses. Overall, I'd have to say owning – and

maintaining — an older home is always interesting and exciting! Ah, the domino effect of trying to repair one thing...which always leads to five other things that need to be repaired first.

## **What do you do for a living? What's your favorite part of your job?**

I work for the City of Lincoln Urban Development Department, with a job title of "planning assistant." Primarily, that involves public information activities: a quarterly newsletter, displays, advertisements, brochures, and Web page management. Urban Development manages Lincoln's federal entitlements from the US Housing and Urban Development Department. These federal funds must be used to benefit low-and moderate-income people – for housing maintenance and construction, job creation and retention, and public improvements that provide a safe living environment. We also work to strengthen Lincoln's older neighborhoods. My favorite part of the job is any project that involves using desktop publishing software.

## **What is Lincoln's best kept secret?**

Here's my list: the free homebuyer training class sponsored by NeighborWorks®Lincoln, Oso Burrito at 15th and O Streets, Ivanna Cone in the Haymarket, and the walking trails at the Pioneer Park Nature Center.

## **Why did you decide to stay at St. Mark's on the Campus?**

There are several things about St. Mark's on the Campus that I appreciate: people with open minds and hearts, sermons that keep me thinking and keep me from feeling too comfortable, and singing that's loud enough that people can't hear my random pitch changes – I like to sing, I just don't do it well!

**In your opinion, what are some strengths of the Episcopal Church?**

To me, one of the most important strengths is the expectation that we should each be engaged intellectually with our faith journeys...questions and all. It is important to me that thinking and learning plays an equal role with doctrine and scripture.

**In your opinion, what is an important issue we face as a church? Or as a nation?**

The most destructive force at work in the world right now is extremism. Often linked to a religion, but not always, extremism destroys tolerance and denies that every human being has a "spark" of God in them.

In politics, I am most frustrated by the inability of elected officials to think further in the future than the next election. The result is that the long term effects of their actions are "someone else's problem".

**What are some of your hobbies and interests outside of work?**

Remember that hobby activity I mentioned earlier? The one where Eric and I met? Well, it's called the Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA) and it's a nonprofit, educational group focused on the European Middle Ages and Renaissance. While we aren't as active as we were in the early 80's, we actively enjoy this hobby – and that "we" includes the kids. Anything that was done during those times is fair game for research and hands on re-creation or re-enactment: tournaments, archery, calligraphy, cooking, brewing, dancing, sewing, weaving, spinning, dying, painting, armoring, shoemaking, heraldry, equestrian activities, etc. All these things could be separate hobbies outside of the SCA are unified through pageantry, ceremony, and lots of good, interesting people.

**If you could live in any time period, when would you live and why?**

In spite of a hobby that explores the Middle Ages and Renaissance, I have no inclination to actually live in that time period. I like modern things too much: medicine and hygiene, communications and, yes, eye glasses. I'd be blind as a bat in the Middle Ages.

Actually, except for some painful conflicts in the world, right now is a perfectly good time to be alive.

**What book have you read recently that you think others should read?**

I don't do much serious reading, but I would highly recommend a fantasy trilogy called The Deed of Paksenarrion. This substantial series follows the life of a young woman who starts out as a soldier and ends up being essentially a saint (in the context of the fantasy... this is NOT theology). The depth of detail and the character development are well-balanced with an ability to tell a gripping story.

**Who is your favorite saint?**

Is there a patron saint of people who forget names? I really should find out and write down his/her name...

**Watercolor Landscapes by Richard Sutton**

*Landscape architect -- and one of St. Mark's own!*

For more than 30 years Sutton has taught graphic communication, plant materials and design, in the landscape design option for horticulture majors and now in the newly organized landscape architecture program at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. An exhibition of watercolor paintings by Sutton will be on display **Aug. 15 through Sept. 30 at UNL's Great Plains Art Gallery, 1155 Q St.** The exhibition, titled "Machine in the Garden," records impressions of a small part of the Great Plains landscape. This is the first watercolor show for Sutton, a 20-year fellow in UNL's Center for Great Plains Studies.

Coming to watercolor painting from a background in rendering landscapes as a part of his architecture training, Sutton is self-taught. He learns from looking closely at the work of others and as he admits, "by making lots of mistakes." He also learns by looking closely at the landscape around us and has about a half-dozen sketchbooks in which he has recorded pencil and ink impressions of designed landscapes from the United States, Europe and Japan. For this show, small formats and the use of watercolors for rapid sketching allowed him to capture the dynamic Great Plains skylines.
