From the Rector

Dear Friends,

By the time you receive this issue of the Roar, the highlight of the Christian year will be only a few weeks away. Holy Week, that time between Palm Sunday and Easter morning, will occur this year from March 16 - 23. One of the ways our Prayer Book marks Holy Week's significance is that it provides special liturgies for the most important days of the week: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.

The week begins with Palm Sunday: Sunday of the Passion. This day has a twofold focus. First is the liturgy of the Palms, when we commemorate Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem, riding a donkey and praised to the heavens by people with palm branches. The second part of this liturgy is a reading of the passion of our Lord, when Jesus is abandoned by those very same palm-waving followers. These two foci deliberately stand in stark contrast to each other.

As Holy Week is the high point of the Christian year, so the Triduum is the high point of Holy Week. These are the three days of Holy Thursday (evening), Good Friday and Holy Saturday, culminating in the celebration of the Resurrection at The Great Vigil of Easter. These days are properly thought of as one liturgical movement, even though they occur over three days.

Maundy Thursday takes its name

from Jesus' words, "I give you a new commandment [Latin: *mandatum*], that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34) On this evening, we mark the founding of the meal/experience that developed into the Eucharist. The norm in the Episcopal Church is to include the foot washing ceremony as an indication of the nature of the community Jesus draws around him. At St. Mark's on the Campus, the tradition has been to include it every other year, as we did last year. This Eucharist ends with the stripping of the altar, one of the most striking rituals of Holy Week. After we strip the altar, we move into an overnight Watch, a time that commemorates Jesus' hours in the Garden of Gethsemane with his disciples, and his request of them to watch with him while he prays. (Matthew 24)

On Good Friday, our Prayer Book offers what I find to be one of the most moving liturgies within it. It's often referred to as the "Solemn Good Friday Liturgy" because of The Solemn Collects which are part of the liturgy. The biddings to prayer and the collects in this section are especially moving on this day on which we mark our Lord's crucifixion. The liturgy is done in a variety of ways in parishes; we include a reverence of a cross, when people who are so moved come before a crucifix and honor God in a variety of ways: some kneel deeply before it, others kiss the

feet of Christ hanging upon it, others simply say a quiet prayer of thanksgiving.

On Saturday morning, we have the Holy Saturday liturgy, a very simple liturgy that has a couple of prayers, a reading, and a homily. This year I'll be reading an ancient homily on this day. This liturgy marks Jesus' time in the tomb, and his "descent to the dead," as the Apostle's Creed says - a way of expressing that the salvation found in Christ is available to all, living and dead alike.

The highlight of the Triduum is the Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday evening. At this liturgy, we hear several readings tracing the history of our salvation, culminating in the resurrection story. We celebrate our risen life in Christ with baptisms when we have them and with the renewal of our own baptismal vows. And together we celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter. It is the golden liturgy of the Christian year, beginning what is referred to as "The Queen of Seasons," the "Great Fifty Days" of the Easter season. This is a liturgy you don't want to miss!

My prayers are with you as we continue our Lenten journey, moving steadily toward that week ahead of us, the holiest liturgical time of the Christian year. Following is a listing of our Holy Week liturgies: I hope to see you there!

"Proclaiming the Gospel "

I was digging around in the undercroft before Advent. I was looking for something Advent related, and I do not remember now if I ever found it. Advent came and went without any major harangue, so I assume I found what ever it was I was looking for that particular day. What I came across though was a shoebox full of some old parish black and white photographs.

Judging from the haircuts and other indications, the pictures appeared to be from of the old college chapel era, circa sometime around 1950. One particular picture, dated 1949, has a host of fully vested choir members and altar boys wearing lacy cottas in front of a sign that reads "University Episcopal Church." The priest in the picture is vested with chasuble, stole, embroidered cincture, and maniple.

(If you are scoring at home, one point if you know what a stole is, two points if you know what a chasuble, cotta, or cincture is, and 5 points if you know what a maniple is. For an added bonus, 5 points if you know for what purpose a maniple was used and for

another 5 points if you know why they fell into disuse.)

My particular favorite of the photographs I found was one of what appeared to be some sort of bible study. The priest is in the center, apparently leading the bible study, with about 5 students around him, all with open bibles. The priest in the picture was at St Mark's in the late 1950s. (Five additional points if you can name the priest.) What I find amusing about the picture is that all the men, including the priest himself, have a cigarette in one hand and a bible in the other. None of the cigarettes appeared to have filters, so one can only imagine how lovely that bible study smelled.

As I got to looking closer at that particular picture, I noticed, with some irony, that a bookshelf behind one of the students had several Living Church magazines (some things in the Episcopal Church never change) displayed as well as a Look magazine with what appeared to be a very young Billy Graham enthusiastically preaching from a wooden pulpit which is juxtaposed in front of a stained glass window of Jesus.

Unfortunately, as amusing as that picture was, many people outside the walls of the church still have that view of church, which is why many people do not care to step inside the door. When I was in England over a year ago, I learned that at some point over the last half decade that the Church of

England had published some sort of study document called "Fresh Expressions of Church" to combat this problem. This initiative outlined ways the Jolly Old Church of England could create new, non-traditional churches, whether that be coffee house ministries or "Goth" Eucharists. (Again, if you are scoring at home, please deduct ten points from your score if you actually know what a Goth Eucharist is because, trust me, you really do not want to know.)

Of course, in true cynical British humor, most of the seminarians had a veritable field day with the term "Fresh Expressions of Church." One group of students even went so far as to have parody T-shirts printed that read, "Stale Expressions of Church." Cynicism aside, the premise of the study document was to take "church" outside of the church walls.

As we approach Easter, the question I would pose to you is "how do you proclaim the gospel once you walk out the church door?" If you have an immediate and solid answer, give yourself an additional 25 points. If not, consider why. Your answer may surprise you. At the least, it may give you something to ponder as we come to the resurrection of our Lord. We all have ministries, and those ministries only begin in church on Sundays. The good news of Jesus stays fresh; your ministry should as well.
