From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Each year we host a Blessing of the Animals around Saint Francis Day. This year, that blessing will occur on Sunday, Oct 5th at 4 p.m. in the courtyard.

Why do we bless animals? Really, we're blessing not just the animal but the relationship that we have with the animals. Those of us who are pet lovers know how much joy our pets add to our lives. The journey would not be the same without them, and we're deeply grateful to God for them. Pronouncing God's blessing upon them is a way of expressing how much they bless us, how deeply we value them -- and how deeply God values them, us, and the peace that is brought to God's creation through our mutual caring.

I'm always aware at this time of year of the considerable irony that occurs with the Blessing of the Animals, during this period of church history when our tradition as well as many other traditions live in a certain degree of turmoil over blessings. I've heard gay and lesbian brothers and sisters express their pain about the fact that the church sanctions the blessing of pets while fighting over whether it should bless human relationships.

And it's true, isn't it? We pronounce God's blessing not only on relationships between cats and people, dogs and people, rats and people, etc., and in my time as a priest I've blessed linens, crosses, houses, cars, rosaries, icons, lots of food, and a multitude of other items (as well as an unmarried elderly couple -- that invited its own controversy!), but I've never had the pleasure of blessing a same

sex relationship. And if I did, I'd have to be very careful about how I did it. (I have presided over a liturgical "divorce" of a same sex couple, a rite I'd like to see implemented for hetero couples who find themselves going separate ways.)

I guess what I'm suggesting is that I would love to see the church take blessing more seriously. It's deplorable that we will bless a relationship between my cat and me but that we officially would hesitate before blessing the relationship between two people simply because they are of the same sex. Is our God really so small, so limited in vision? Of course, some would say yes, God is precisely that way.

I say "Phooey!" Not the God that I know, the God that has come to me in so many ways over the years, bringing me to my knees in gratitude for the boundless love I experience in God, and for my failure to live into that love as fully as I might. No, that God rejoices in love in the many ways we experience it, and rejoices in the many ways that material things -- including our beasts, including all whom we love and who love us -- help us to rejoice in life with God and draw closer to God and one another.

I hope to see many of you there for the Blessing of the Animals we cherish. Even if you don't have a pet, feel free to come and rejoice with the rest of us who do! Give thanks with us. And remember the many ways God enriches our lives, with our pets, with one another, with ideas and people who push us to larger and more loving and more holy notions of the God we serve together.

“Retreat, Day 2:

An Encounter with St. Benedict”

The following is a verbatim excerpt from my personal journal while on retreat at Blue Cloud Abbey.

“Brothers, divine scripture calls to us, saying, 'Whoever exalts himself shall be humbled and whoever humbles himself will be exalted'...The first step in humility, then, is that a man keeps the fear of God 'always before his eyes' and never forgets it.”

Today I learned a valuable lesson that St. Benedict tried to instill in his monks in Chapter 7 of his Rule of Life. It is this same rule that governs this abbey in Marvin, South Dakota, and has governed all Benedictine abbeys for centuries. This monastery is a beautiful place to take spiritual retreat, as the abbey is in the northeast corner of South Dakota and sits on some 1500 acres, has a retreat center, two secluded hermitages, and two recreational ponds for both the monks and retreatants to use. It is on this pond that I learned all too well the Benedictine Rule regarding humility that I have quoted above.

On this particular morning after Lauds, or what we call Morning Prayer, and breakfast with the brothers of the abbey, I decided to explore the grounds. After visiting the monastery cemetery, I found myself on a path that led down to the northern pond, which is a sizable body of water as ponds go. At the end of the path lay a small dock with both a large canoe and a small kayak.

A few of the monks were on the the opposite shore. One was fishing with the other apparently sitting in quiet meditation. (Having done both, I can honestly say there is little actual dif-

ference between fishing and meditating on the shore of a pond.) The brother who was fishing called to me from across the pond, saying I was welcome to use the boats if I wished. “I just needed to be careful,” he said.

As I had spent many an hour in my youth fishing from a canoe, I fancied myself a good oarsman. Instead of sticking with the canoe with which I was more familiar, I assumed I was quite competent enough to handle a kayak. Thus, I crammed my too tall frame into a too small kayak and pushed off into the water on a brisk September morning.

I paddled about 15 feet into the pond when I realized, much to my horror, that kayaks are quite unlike canoes in that they capsize quite easily. As the reader of this journal will no doubt have guessed by now, in I went with one big splash, clerical collar and all, into the dark and surprising cold water of northern South Dakota. I luckily had the foresight to place my cell phone and my camera on the dock, but unfortunately not my wallet. By the time I had thrashed around the water enough to get myself out of the kayak and near the shore, I was soaking wet from head to toe and reeking of pond water.

The monks had come running and helped me out of the water, after which I could tell they were trying very hard to suppress their laughter. With all the clerical dignity I could muster, I thanked them politely and squeaked off back to my room, remembering some other words of St. Benedict, “The 9th step of humility is that a monk controls his tongue and remains silent.”

As I write this journal entry, I am sitting in a chair, waiting for the contents of my wallet to dry. For any who might read this, I commend for your spiritual growth a period of reflection on these virtues of silence and humility. While it reminded me of my baptism, perhaps the reader will learn the merit of such virtues without the need to experience the fear of God in the form of an unexpected dip in an ice cold monastery pond.

ACOLYTE MINISTRY

Last year, grad student and Sunday School teacher, Leighannah Akins brought to our attention the financial needs of a shelter for Native American women. The September Amnesty International report says bloggers contributed significantly to the **PRETTY BIRD WOMEN'S HOUSE** on the Standing Rock Reservation on the North & South Dakota border, resulting in a much better facility. This is wonderful news, and encouraging feedback for anyone who prayed about or responded to the concern.

CLOTHING CONSCIOUSNESS: My daughters went "thrifting" recently. I didn't know this term for shopping thrift stores! Over the years, many church people have mentioned shopping at consignment and thrift stores. I always thought it was about money! But, it's fashionable! It's also a form of recycling that's good for the environment and a way to participate less with an economic system based on low pay and no benefits for many workers.

WHY JOIN THE CHURCH? Many factors, of course. Recent gospel readings reminded me of the years when I was making deeper commitments to follow Christ and to be a part of the church. One that continues to be important to me is Matthew 16:13-20 when Jesus is saying, "on this rock I will found my church... I will give you the keys to the kingdom... and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven..."

I understood this to mean that particular gifts are given to the church. To get the whole enchilada, we have to be part of the church. I'm thankful for this teaching and the way the church has enriched my life.

MEMORIAL WINDOWS

Bringing Colorful Light into
Saint Mark's on the Campus

After the more than forty years since Saint Mark's was built a design has been accepted that will add color to the nave and sanctuary windows. The design for the Memorial Windows will continue the tradition of the current clear windows by partially overlaying them with bands of colored glass.

Julee Lowee of our parish is the stained glass artist and comments on their design:

"The idea came to me one Sunday, to just have ribbons of color through mostly clear glass. That way we can have the marvelous light and still have some color and movement. I have designed a flow of color that embodies the liturgical seasons. Somber reds and purples of Lent, glorious yellows and dazzling white for Christmas and Easter and greens and blues for all of the "ordinary" time in between. The design flows from one window to the next, but they are far enough apart that each can stand by itself."

You can participate in this project. Each of the sixteen Memorial Windows will cost \$2000. For this contribution, you would be the sole designator to name a memorial window. Memorials can be designated for an individual, individuals, a family or a group. You can also designate a portion of a memorial window for \$500 or multiples thereof.
