From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Well, whatever the groundhog says, I think Spring has started. I know that we had the worst snowstorm of the season after February 2, but to me it feels more like spring than it does winter. And when it feels like spring to me, I have to discipline myself big time not to get out in my garden. At least not to get out there and do the things that I want to do; it really takes no discipline at all to restrain myself from the other tasks!

Lent comes from the Old English word for spring, or literally, the lengthening of days.

Lent, too, is a time of discipline. Sometimes we give something up for Lent. Shortly before the season begins, some of our college students are taking a trip to Holy Family Shrine -- and stopping at Baker's Chocolates on the way back, in case they are giving up chocolate for Lent!

Others of us take on a new discipline; I've heard of people who pray more during Lent and people who adopt a social outreach ministry during Lent.

I myself plan on trying to be more disciplined about the daily Examen prayer this year during Lent.

Whatever we do, we do it with the intent of making it easier for God to touch and transform our lives.

Chocolate deprivation in and of itself is not good for the soul; I'm not even sure it's good for the body -- although I know it's not good for the spirit! But if we deprive ourselves of chocolate for the purpose of remembering the sacrifice that is at the heart of God, we move, by grace, more deeply into the spirit of that sacrifice.

And if we pray more often in order to be touched more powerfully by our encounter with Jesus, we move more deeply into the center, into the heart, of all that exists.

I pray that Lent 2009 will be for you a time of new growth in the Spirit of Christ, a time in which the soil of your soul is prepared for what Christ wants to plant in you. As I was writing this article, I looked out my window and saw a man walking in the sunlight; at one point, he lifted his head and let the light shine down on his face, enjoying every molecule, or wave, or whatever light is! So may it be for you this Lent: revel in the light as it shines on you.

- Heard that the Audit Committee for 2008 is beginning its work in the coming weeks. Members of the committee are: Mary Lutz, Lisa Sutton, Michelle Waite, and Susan Steinegger.
- Amended the budget, adding \$200 to the Faith line item in order to reinstate continuing education monies for Deacon Grosh that had previously been removed.
- Discussed how best to finance SMOC serving as a performance site for the 2009-10 Lincoln Organ Showcase. The Senior Warden will be raising funds for the purpose, and the Director of Music is willing to use a portion of the Music budget for this purpose.
- Discussed canonical expectations of the Vestry and began working toward a Mutual Ministry Review.
- Approved to paying Julee's Stained Glass \$1,667 to begin work on two windows for the nave, bringing to 13 the total number of windows now under contract.
- Reviewed the Letters of Agreement for Deacon Grosh for her Campus Outreach work and Pastor Naugle for her affiliation with SMOC as a Priest Associate. (A Priest Associate is a non-stipendiary position that gives the Priest a community with which to be affiliated where his or her ministry can be exercised, as well as an additional clerical presence within the community.)
- Assigned Vestry member liaisons to committees.

THE DEACON'S DOOR *by Christine Grosh*

No Flamenco Sermon: Several years ago Helen, Nora and I were in a flamenco class. Each week I would leave with a brain feeling like mush! The moves were so complex! Feet, hands, skirts, body posture, rhythms with castanets would be a blur in my mind. It dawned on me that the teacher had confidence in herself that she could get us ready for the recital and that I could trust her to do her job. I did need to show up and pay attention and practice! I started to see how many parallels there were between learning the flamenco dances and learning my Christian faith. Having good leadership, the teacher teaching well and modeling highly skilled dancing were essential. It was also a great pleasure to witness! The Christian faith is the same! When I experience someone who has done the work of integrating the faith, it touches my heart at the deepest level. It does not mean, "NO PAIN", it means that the pain is used to bring about God's purposes.

Just this week another flamenco parallel dawned on me. Have you ever watched professional basketball and noticed how easy they make it look? When I told the dance instructor I'd be going to see Jose Porcel at the Lied, she commented it would be so smooth it would look simple. And it was. I walked out of the performance thinking it looked like a piece of cake! No big deal! But the muscle memory I have from actually dancing the flamenco is almost like an ache. An intense, compelling complex response to the passionate music. The life at St. Mark's is like that on Sunday mornings. We make it look beautiful and easy. Someone who doesn't know us well may think it's a 'piece of cake', that we haven't gone deeply into the life of Christ. A dear friend of mine, Connie Backus-Yoder, was chatting with Bishop Krotz and others at their confirmation. He asked her what made St. Mark's worth joining. Her characterization of our congregation holds true for me: "highly talented people giving their best to God."

Last year I had this great urge to give my flamenco sermon. When I ran the idea past people, I kind of got a 'roll of the eyes' response that made me think it might be an embarrassment. I haven't danced now in a year, and I feel too out of touch with the skills to do a flamenco sermon! Aren't you relieved? I hope I never get 'out of practice' of my Christian life: the beliefs, the ethics, the liturgy, the Bible, the community. All of it have made my life so rich! I'm going to keep practicing the dance and trust that Jesus will keep the Biblical promise to bring us to completion and maturity...not quite the same as getting us ready for the recital! Thank you for creating and sustaining this vibrant community. The journey here continues to be such a joy for me and life-giving to my family. As Kelly Gray Carlisle might say, "I heart you."

PAINTERS AND DONORS NEEDED

Before that Sunday's events two actions are needed. First, by mid-March the wooden frames that will be used to hold the stained glass in place need to be painted. Painting frames might be an ideal Lenten obligation for families and individuals to undertake.

There are 3 ½ windows left to be memorialized, so there are still opportunities to purchase a window as a memorial. A single window is \$2000 – three still available. A partial window is \$500 – two still available. It would be great to have all 16 windows bought before the dedication on April 26th.
