From the Lion's Lair

Dear Friends,

Stewardship is always in the back of my mind, especially this time of year as we gather financial pledges for next fiscal year and begin planning a budget. I've found myself pondering financial stewardship in light of our economy, and I was reminded of one of the realities of financial stewardship: the difference between taking our tithe out of "discretionary" money and taking it off the top of our income. One requires a different commitment from the other, and the two reflect different spiritualities.

On the one hand, if we treat our pledge as a discretionary item, what does that imply about our relationship with God? Is that how we treat that relationship? As discretionary? As optional? And if we write our check "to the church" first, does that imply a different relationship with God? One that places God first? The kind of relationship scripture and church tradition calls us into, that we might grow in our trust of God?

I know in my own journey of faith, I can think of lots of places our tithe could go other than St. Mark's on the Campus. It could be put away for college for Andrew and Elizabeth, or go toward a nice vacation for our family each year, or even to pay somebody else to fix things around the house that I don't have enough time (or talent!) to do!

But the mistake in that thinking is that my offering is not essentially to SMOC; it's to God. We just happen to have SMOC as our primary faith community. God deserves at least a tenth of my resources; actually God deserves all of them. I hope that all my financial resources go to support God's work; I know that when I turn them over to the church, I am offering to the work of God a major portion of what I have, and I am trusting that God will help my family and I work out the rest with what is left. God's part of the bargain has always held up.

One of the hardest parts for me is letting go of the funds, truly turning the money over to God in the community of faith as represented in the Vestry. What if I disagree with some decision? (The Rector doesn't agree with every decision the Vestry makes!)

But God doesn't ask me to agree with every decision, but to be part of the community, and to participate with the very best of all my gifts. If I start focusing on having my way, I'll be missing the opportunity to truly participate in the community of faith, the community of trust in God. We can only know the overwhelming blessings that come with being part of a community of God when we fully participate, with our money and our hearts; and rarely is one able truly to participate with the heart if one is withholding other gifts. That's the nature of God's economy, or as Jesus put it, where our treasure is, there our heart will be also. And where it isn't, it's harder for our heart to be.

Giving to God is no more optional than being part of the community of faith is; that's the way God made us. And living into the way God made us is always an invitation filled with grace and blessing.

May those blessings be with St. Mark's on the Campus
as we look ahead to 2010!

The Warden's Words

STEWARDSHIP. As we have often heard from Fr. Tim Anderson and others, stewardship is our total involvement in, and gifts to, our Parish. It ranges from our prayers for our Parish family members and attending Sunday services to hours of service in tasks like painting or selling books. For the healthy continuance of the Parish, one form of very essential stewardship is returning to the Parish some of our God given personal financial gifts. Each year we are asked to indicate through a pledge what this return will be for the next year. Our Parish 2010 pledge campaign is taking place during the month of October. First you will receive a letter from the Wardens and Treasurer explaining our expected needs and their uses for the year. They are based upon a preliminary 2010 budget as proposed by the Finance Committee and adopted by the Vestry. During the services on the first three Sundays of October, you will hear more about pledging and the pledge campaign. The pledge campaign will end on October 18th and we will celebrate its success with a potluck lunch on November 1st. Please keep this important campaign in your prayers.

LEADERSHIP. As a Parish, we have a great wealth of talented and diverse leaders. However often personal situations and feelings of reluctance prevent this wealth from serving the Parish. Offering the gift of leadership to the Parish even though it may represent personal sacrifice is an important form of stewardship and essential for the life and vitality of the Parish. Please consider offering this gift as we look for candidates for the Vestry and Jr. Warden in the months ahead. At the Sep 19th retreat, the Vestry voted to present a single slate of candidates for the Vestry positions to include Jr. Warden which will be open in 2010-2011. The slate will be announced to the Parish by December 2009. Further candidates can be nominated from the floor at the Annual Meeting and would then result in an election. The nominating committee will consist of the three outgoing Vestry members and two additional Parish members. Final committee membership will be announced in October.

APPRECIATION. Our Parish has a fine tradition of generally thanking persons frequently for their stewardship in all its forms and specifically thanking a few with the "Extraordinary Service" award at the Annual Meeting in January. The Vestry has appointed a committee to solicit names for this award for 2010; it will be chaired by Opal Doerr and includes Jim Karas, Kelly Carlisle and the Sr. Warden. Please think about deserving nominees for this award and let a committee member know their names. It is customary for the nominator to submit a letter of support for the nominee.

COMMUNICATION. During the past few weeks I have again been reminded of the importance of open and honest communication for the well-being of our Parish family. In recent discussions with a variety of persons I find that we as a family depend too much on what could be termed "triangular communication." This is when two persons discuss concerns about a third but not with the third party. The problems from such a method of communicating usually result in misinformation, at the best, or no information, at the worst, reaching the third party. If such a communication system expands without the third party's involvement, disaster can result. As Sr. Warden I am often party to such "triangular communication." Please help me to remember that the third party should be directly involved in the communication also.

MUTUAL MINISTRY REVIEW REPORT

In this edition of the “Lion’s Roar is the Vestry adopted final report on the Mutual Ministry Review (MMR) that we as a parish have been undertaking over the past six months. It represents a lot of work by the Vestry and Lisa Sutton, Todd Sneller and Andrea Nelson. But more importantly, it represents meaningful input from a large number of our Parish members. Thanks to all who participated. The MMR report will serve as a guide for our Parish over the next three years. It indicates what we feel should be our goals for that period. It also identifies a mutual process by the Parish clergy and lay leaders to annually assess and evaluate our progress on meeting those goals. Please join together as we all strive towards the accomplishment of these goals and pray for that effort to make us an improved Christian community.

PARISH GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

INCLUSIVE. “Encourage an inclusive, diverse, welcoming and accepting community.”

1. Develop an active parish welcome and diversity committee
2. Create a GLBT support group in the parish.

COLLEGE. “Grow our ministry to post-secondary institutions for their students, faculty and staff in Lincoln and the surrounding area.”

1. Create and foster an environment that welcomes all students wherever they are in their spiritual journey.
2. Continue to provide support for students, faculty and staff of surrounding colleges and universities
3. Provide opportunities for collaboration between other ministries from different denominations who support students, faculty and staff

PARTICIPATION. “Increase the number of actively participating and new parish members.”

1. Encourage membership participation in activities of the parish by actively recruiting/inviting through “ministry fairs” and the “parish calling tree.”
2. Provide quality programming to meet the needs and to encourage participation of parish members.
3. Provide shepherding for parish members.
4. Explore “membership recruitment” activities.

OUTREACH. “Continue to expand the parish ministries of outreach to the community.”

1. Actively work with parish members in identifying outreach programs to assist.
2. Work collaboratively with community agencies in developing effective outreach programs.
3. Expand our efforts in developing parish outreach ministries.

PHYSICAL. “Insure that the parish building both interior and exterior, grounds and facilities are kept at the highest level to fulfill the parish functions and goals.”

1. Prioritize goals for maintaining building and grounds
2. Develop long term and short term goals and schedules to guide annual work on building and grounds
3. Increase the parish capital improvement fund(s) through planned giving by parish member, alumni and others.

ANNUAL GOAL SETTING AND ASSESSMENT OF MINISTRY

An annual goal setting and assessment session will be held by the Rector and Wardens to determine how the parish and the Rector are addressing the MMR goals and objectives. This session will include a review of the Rector’s goals and objectives for the current year and those planned for the next year. The results of this session will be reported to the Vestry by the Senior Warden.

MMR SCHEDULING A Mutual Ministry Review of the parish shall be conducted every three years by the Parish Vestry and Clergy before the adoption of the budget for the succeeding year.

MUSICAL NOTES BY KURT KNECHT

GLORIA (PART 3) – The remainder of the Gloria is difficult to appropriate from the perspective of 21st century culture. The Gloria contains several lists of acclamations describing titles. We say, “Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father,” and “Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God.” In the last section Jesus is also described as “the Holy One,” “the Lord,” and “the Most High.” In our culture, when we honor someone, we normally like to make a list of his/her accomplishments. We don’t tend to list titles that describe who they are. In this prayer, when we aren’t listing titles, we either say what we are doing “worship...thanks...praise”, or we are petitioning for “mercy” and the reception of our prayer. The only contemporary context that I have discovered where something similar occurs for all of us is with Fr. Jerry. Though we don’t often use them, Jerry carries several titles. If I think of “Father Jerry”, I think of someone who is lovingly caring for our spiritual needs. If I think of “the Rector”, I am thinking of someone who is charged with the various responsibilities of overseeing a parish. If I think of Dr. Jerry Thompson, I think of someone who has been trained academically to work on specific theological and pastoral problems. If I think of “my priest”, the “Reverend Jerry Thompson”, I think of someone that has been called and ordained by the church and given authority to consecrate sacraments and pronounce God’s forgiveness to us. There is also just “Jerry” who is my friend. I have always found that one of Jerry’s great gifts is to be able to slip in and out of his various functions depending on the specific need that I have. There are certain times that I need him as a priest and not as a friend and vice versa.

One of the great beauties of the Gloria is the way that it can challenge us spiritually with its alternating lists of titles, acclamations, and petitions. There is a wonderful selflessness in the beginning when we list the titles of God the Father and simply worship without requesting anything. There is also a danger that the titles can become disconnected from the power of a living God. The power of having someone called “priest” among us becomes very real when we can go and ask for him or her to audibly pronounce God’s forgiveness to us when our inner thoughts are telling us that it might not be true. In the same way, there is a pernicious falsehood that can creep into our spiritual lives when we think that the primary interaction we have with God is just adoration and nothing more. God is already all the things we say about God before we say them. Saying that God is “Holy” or “the Most High” does not make God holier or higher. God can make rocks to worship, but rocks don’t ask for mercy from God. In *Cost of Discipleship*, Bonhoeffer describes the beauty of asking for something. “The child asks of the Father whom he knows. Thus the essence of Christian prayer is not general adoration, but definite, concrete petition. The right way to approach God is to stretch out our hands and ask of One who we know has the heart of a Father.” The Gloria pushes us beyond our desires for vague mystical worship to concrete interaction with the God who “receives our prayer” and “has mercy on us.” In the prayer, we describe a God who can do something about a problem and ask that God to fix it. It is simple, beautiful, intimate worship.
