
## From Fr. Robert Magoola

#### From Deacon Rich

Several years ago, Verneda and I decided that we would take a trip to Ireland. We renewed our passports and talked about all the places we'd like to visit. My great grandfather had been born in County Roscommon around 1850 and family legend has it that he stowed away on a ship to America when he was fourteen. I couldn't confirm the date that he arrived in America since a fire at Ellis Island destroyed the records prior to mid-1920's.

When we were finalizing our travel plans, COVID hit! Our plans went on the back burner. Then, this spring, we started talking about what we would do to celebrate our Silver Anniversary, Verneda's birthday in September, and my birthday in July. Verneda insisted that we take that trip to Ireland; she really wanted to go. I was undecided for three or four weeks; it would cost too much, what would we do with our dog and cat, who would look after the yard and garden?

I woke up one morning with an epiphany that the march of time had become more of a double time for me than a march. That morning during a break from my school bus routes, I went online and purchased two round trip tickets to Dublin, Ireland.

The flight was noneventful. I hadn't been on commercial flight since 2011 when Verneda and I traveled to the Dominican Republic. A lot has changed! The planes carry a lot more passengers and the spaces between seats and the aisles are cramped by any standards. Thankfully, in our 3-seat section there were just the two of us. Nevertheless, that was perhaps the longest eleven hours of my life, except maybe my first night at boot camp in the Marines.

Our first stop, where we stayed four days, was in Strokestown, in County Roscommon about 30 miles from Dublin. It was quite an experience for me driving on the left side of the road! On our first day, we found our way to the National Irish Famine Museum about half a mile from where we were staying. The Museum documents the famine of 1847. For me, the Museum was most memorable for several reasons.

The impact of the famine on individuals was recorded in personal letters, death records and other documents. Working our way through the museum brought both of us to tears as we watched videos of actors reading the letters and other personal documents which recorded the personal impact of the Great Hunger on the population of Ireland.

Mothers carried the bodies of their children to the cemeteries and dropped them over the fences hoping that someone would bury their babies in hallowed ground. The bodies piled up in the streets because there simply weren't enough people to bury the dead in a timely fashion. I can only imagine what my great grandfather's family must have experienced that compelled him to travel to America as a teenager.

The Irish Potato Famine began in 1845 when a mold caused a destructive plant disease that spread rapidly throughout Ireland and Europe. The infestation ruined up to one-half of the potato crop that year, and about three-quarters of the crop over the next seven years. Because the tenant farmers of Ireland—then ruled as a colony of Great Britain—relied heavily on the potato as a source of food, the infestation had a catastrophic impact on Ireland and its population. Before it ended in 1852, the Potato Famine resulted in the death of roughly one million Irish from starvation and related causes, with at least another million forced to leave their homeland as refugees. Ireland lost nearly half of its population the Great Hunger in just seven years.

We spent fourteen days touring Ireland in our rental car, visiting more than a dozen different tourist attractions. I've included pictures of some of those attractions. Everywhere we traveled we met wonderful, friendly people. We worshiped in a small Irish Anglican Church the last Sunday on our trip. Verneda led Morning Prayer. I even ran into a possible distant cousin (a Kelly!) whose family was from Roscommon County.

If you have ever thought about traveling to Ireland, Verneda and I highly recommend the country and its people.

Similarly, the replacement of the church's security and access control system will serve the church for many years, making the building safer for all who enter.

During the Parish Hall and courtyard services, I began to get to know the choir members one-on-one when we did solos instead of choral pieces. This was such a wonderful way to get to know each choir member well, and we became a tight-knit group. I very much enjoyed my time with the music program at St. Mark's! We sang so many great pieces, and due to generous giving, we were also able to bring in friends to help us out with larger works, such as Allegri's *Miserere* on Good Friday. St. Mark's is very lucky to have the strong voices it has in the choir, as well as a music-loving congregation.

One great example of the dedication to music -- both for worship and the wider community -- is the acquisition of the Yamaha 7 foot grand piano. Many pianists in the community have said that it is one of the best in town (second only to the Steinway concert grands at the Lied and the UN-L School of Music!) So many great recitals and concerts (and many more to come) have happened at the church. The wonderful acoustics, the piano, and the wonderful organ have helped make it one of the most desired concert venues in the city. Additionally, almost every performance there has been livestreamed, showing how much people appreciate that capability at the church, thus not having to haul their own equipment and worry about it whilst performing.

It was a great pleasure to be a part of the transitions St. Mark's has seen over the past almost three years. I know that the church and congregation will continue their fantastic work for the community and continue to be a notable place of worship and service.

## **Report from the Personnel Committee**

In the interests of transparency, we present this summary of the procedures that resulted in the successful hiring of a new Office Director and Music Director. Todd Sneller led the Personnel Committee, aided by Anne Puls and Jeanine Jewell.

#### **Office Director**

- Based on Ross's update of the job description, the Committee developed an ad that was distributed to all Episcopal churches in Lincoln as well as to the job-search site *Indeed*.
- The Committee developed a list of questions to ask in initial interviews. Questions covered topics such as time management, experience with building operations, interactions with a variety of people, and office skills.
- The committee interviewed all applicants and recommended two for second interviews.
- Fr. Robert, with Jeanine representing the Wardens, met with the recommended candidates.
- Fr. Robert and the Committee agreed to hire David Bloomquist.

#### **Music Director**

- Ross and Jeanine developed an ad, which was approved by the Committee.
- Ross distributed the ad through the Lincoln chapter of the AGO, the UNL School of Music, and other channels.
- For the purposes of this hire, the Committee delegated interviewing responsibilities to Pippa Lawson and Jeanine Jewell.
- Auditions were held; the auditions required playing two organ pieces, accompanying the choir in two hymns, and leading the choir in a rehearsal of a selected piece of music.
- Pippa, Jeanine, and Fr. Robert conducted interviews immediately following each audition.
- The choir met; they and Fr. Robert all agreed on hiring Casey Behm.

**Recital Monitors -** The new position of Recital Monitor provides SMOC with dedicated personnel to set up for recitals and concerts, record and/or stream these events, and close the church properly after events.

- An ad was designed which Ross distributed at Kimball Hall.
- Ross, Todd, and Jeanine interviewed candidates.
- Two candidates were hired: David Pira and Bryce Hayes.

**Recital Monitors** -- Among the many jobs Ross did was coordinating recitals held at our church. This included set-up (moving the piano, setting up music stands, etc.); arranging guest access to the space; and recording of each recital. Per Ross's suggestion, we have established the position of Recital Monitor, following the example used by Kimball Hall for their own recital setups.

Two Recital Monitors have been hired, who will be scheduled by David, the Office Administrator. You might not often see them, because they will be working when a recital is booked. **David Piro** is a recent graduate of UNL's Doctor of Music program in cello performance, and **Bryce Hayes** is a junior in the School of Music, focusing on music composition. Both David and Bryce have previous experience with and knowledge of music technology.

# **Doors and Windows Update**

As you may have noticed (or not!) our security system has been updated. The new system can be remotely operated. Now we can open our facilities for outside groups without driving downtown and we can be sure that our facilities are locked afterwards. There is also now a

camera on the outside courtyard, so we will know how that space is being used when we aren't physically present. The system can be set by the SMoC Office Manager to automatically unlock and lock at specific times. For example, after Sunday services and coffee hour, the doors automatically lock at 12:30 pm unless manually set otherwise. Of course, you can always exit! People who need regular access at odd hours have an electronic key fob to swipe, instead of a physical key and a code to manually (quickly) disarm the alarm.

This fall some interior doors will be replaced -- specifically the door from the hallway to Fr. Robert's office, the door into the vesting/bookkeeper's room, and the door between the office and Fr. Robert's office. The new doors will be solid core and have windows. The solid core will provide better sound proofing for the room occupants and the windows will improve lighting. The doors will be replaced as soon as the new doors are delivered – which should be soon!

#### **Justice in Action**

At Justice in Action's Nehemiah Assembly last May, we asked County Commissioner Rick Vest to invest in expanding our community's successful diversion programs. He told us that "when the time is right, the money will be there."



Lancaster County is considering a \$1 million

budget increase for the County Jail to support boarding contracts to house people in custody in jails outside of Lancaster County, putting people even farther from their support systems. JIA's criminal justice team and other JIA members attended the County Commission meeting in July to voice support for investing in diversion and treatment, **not** jail. Approximately one hundred JIA members attended the meeting, and many provided compelling testimony to the Board. News coverage of the JIA commentary and a related story were reported by several media outlets.

JIA will continue to press the County Board to fund a county-wide assessment of mental health resources. JIA is asking the Board to take a leadership role in funding and coordinating a meeting with mental health providers and advocacy organizations. The goal is to use a dashboard approach to design a more responsive and efficient approach to mental health services. This approach has been used successfully in other states. Current research clearly shows that more efficient delivery of services is possible if a coordinated effort is used on a county-wide basis.

On a related note, the criminal justice committee has opened an ongoing dialogue with the Lancaster County Attorney (CA) on diversion alternatives for consideration. Additional research and communications with the CA are part of an ongoing process this summer.

Because seeking justice through diversion reforms and access to mental health services is an ongoing process, JIA is making plans for the coming year. Dates have been set for JIA events during the second year of the justice initiative. The mental health and criminal justice teams are continuing research meetings and continuing to meet with key decision makers. Fund raising


efforts are continuing, with a focus on corporate entities that support JIA's efforts. Fr. Robert will continue to serve as JIA board chair.






## **Brother Jerry News**
