From Fr. Robert Magoola

2024 Annual Parish Meeting Summary

Following a potluck lunch on January 28, 2024, Fr. Robert started the meeting with a prayer. David Bloomquist was appointed meeting secretary. Minutes of the 2023 annual meeting were briefly reviewed and unanimously approved.

Fr. Robert welcomed everyone and shared a few highlights from his annual report,

- Last summer, we fondly bade Ross Mosier farewell. We welcomed David Bloomquist as Office
 Administrator and Casey Behm as Music Director, both of whom are doing a splendid job. We
 also have two Recital Monitors who assist as needed.
- Our average Sunday attendance was 46. Despite losing some of our regular members to
 death or moving out of state, we've had new people worshipping with us. Thank you for
 inviting your friends, co-workers, and family and for treating our guests like family.
- Our monthly services at Legacy Terrace continue to serve an average of 13 attendees. Thanks to the Hanways, the Shepards, and Jeanne Vannorsdall who often invite / remind their neighbors to attend each third Sunday.
- After serving for two years as co-president for Justice in Action, I stepped down to now serve
 on the Affordable Housing steering committee. Along with others, I am deeply involved in
 researching affordable housing issues and will soon be seeking solutions. St. Mark's on the
 Campus provides office space for Justice in Action staff, Beth Graverholt and Olivia Butts, in
 our basement.

The nomination committee shared their results. Mary Lutz and Jeanine Jewel will continue as cowardens and Jim Karas was nominated as "warden in training". They were all unanimously reaffirmed/approved.

The retiring Warden and Vestry members – Sara LeRoy Toren, Steve Blum, and Nita Sipple – were thanked for their service. The new Vestry nominees were Michaela Halvorson and Todd Sandsted, along with Stan Sipple to complete Jim Karas' term. They were all unanimously approved.



Delegates to Annual Council: Volunteers Jon Flint, Jeanine Jewel, Opal Doerr, and Andrea Nelson (alternate delegate) were unanimously approved.

Treasurer's report – Kevin Cole shared observations about the 2023 fiscal year. Income was somewhat higher than expected, largely due to substantial faith offerings. Expenses were also higher than expected, largely due to the replacement of the old [broken] security system and unexpected plumbing and electrical wiring repairs.

2024 Budget was presented by Mark Musick. The Budget Committee was not able to balance the budget based on pledges, plate, and facility use fees. Due to deaths and relocations, we have fewer pledging units. Three options were proposed to bridge a shortfall of \$53,210.15.

- First, use of Faith Offerings (funds donated by pledgers beyond their annual pledge). If enough Faith Offering funds are available, options two and three will not be
 - Second, with approval of Vestry, shifting funds previously set aside for Rector Search costs (\$25,789.68). If Faith Offerings aren't enough, this second option will be used to address the shortfall. If enough funds are available using the combined options one and two, option three will not be used.
- Third, allow the Vestry to use up to \$27,420.47 of funds from the Building on Faith set aside (BoF). The BoF project (facility improvements) has been completed and all expenses have been paid. The current BoF balance is \$41,937.94 and an additional \$25,000 in BoF pledges is expected to be contributed this final year of the BoF fund drive. Originally, all unused BoF funds were designated by parishioners to increase the principle of the Capital Improvements Endowment Fund. Because the third option would change that designation, it required approval by the parishioners. This is the text of the third option:

St. Mark's parish approves to use the Building on Faith Money for operating expenses in the 2024 annual budget. This money was originally intended to be transferred into principle of the Capital Improvement Endowment. With this vote, up to a maximum of \$27,420 can now be spent for the church in 2024.



There was considerable discussion. An amendment to the option was proposed that would have required any BoF funds used to balance the 2024 budget be replaced at some future point. The amendment was considered at length but failed when put to a vote. The original motion carried: 36 for, 2 against. Overall, parishioners acknowledged that this method of balancing the annual budget is not sustainable.

Retiring Warden, Sara LeRoy Toren, thanked everyone for giving of themselves to make St. Mark's on the Campus the loving, welcoming place that it is. She then presented the 2024 Service Awards to Kim Thomason and Mary Lutz.


All attendees introduced themselves and briefly described their SMoC experience. Mark Musick read his traditional rhyming poem about St. Mark's past year *(see page 10)*. Fr. Robert closed the meeting with a prayer and a blessing around 1:30 pm.

yet. As incentive, St. Mark's is holding a prediction contest. Prediction forms--aka brackets--will be available on the pews or around the church prior to the beginning of Lent.

UNL Marketing Project

How can we introduce residents living in downtown Lincoln to the wonderful worship, music, and community that they can experience at St. Mark's on the Campus? Projections by the Downtown Lincoln Association and others suggest that Lincoln will soon have about 10,000 people living in the downtown area (in off-campus housing). As one of the few churches in immediate proximity to both downtown and campus areas, several parish members have suggested devising an outreach strategy to introduce more people to St. Mark's on the Campus.

We are already reaching out to the campus through musical collaborations with the Korff School of Music. Casey Behm, our new Director of Music, is a graduate student there. We have also retained two student interns as recital monitors to assist with musical events involving School students.

To explore the possibility of a marketing effort that would target downtown residents, Todd Sneller approached the UNL Marketing Department. Rob Simon, an Associate Professor of Marketing quickly responded to an inquiry. He indicated that several students agreed to take on SMOC as a "client" during 2024 and to evaluate marketing strategies. This process was expected to begin in January.

First steps include one or more meetings with Professor Simon and his students, a review of the parish member survey conducted during November as well as a vision statement prepared by Fr. Robert. The marketing project will likely take at least five months. Additional details will be provided as the project evolves.

Warm Clothing for Gathering Place



Thanks to all who supported SMOC's cold weather apparel drive on behalf of the Gathering Place! Lisa Janssen, executive director of the Gathering Place (GP), expressed her gratitude several times. This, our third annual clothing drive, was part of our community outreach effort to help

those in need. Fr. Robert and Todd Sneller both had vehicles filled-to-capacity with donated items. Lisa indicated that the items were distributed to patrons of the GP on December 21 just as a cold weather system hit Lincoln.

Scheels was again an important partner with SMOC. Scheels contributed over \$3,000 of clothing items. The apparel was given to Near South neighborhood residents most in need of this help. The Gathering Place indicated that virtually all the clothing items were distributed in about an hour. Contributed items included warm outerwear, stocking caps and gloves, sweatshirts, and sweatpants. as well as sleeping bags. Connie Backus-Yoder also contributed a dozen handmade blankets for children. Other contributions included personal hygiene items such as lip balm, toilet paper, bar soap, and hand lotion. This outreach project is an annual effort to help many in Lincoln who do not have adequate warm clothing for our winter weather.
