


From Fr. Robert Magoola

Doors and Windows Update

This spring and summer there will be some work done at St. Mark's to update some doors and our security systems. Four doors will be replaced, including the three doors from the hallway to the Sanctuary, Fr. Robert's office, and the vesting/bookkeeper's room, and the door between the office and Fr. Robert's office. The new doors will be solid core and have windows. The solid core will provide better sound proofing for the room occupants and the windows will improve lighting. The doors will be replaced as soon as the new doors are delivered – we're waiting...

As the number of outside groups using our facility has increased, it became clear that our security system needed to be updated. The new system will allow us to ensure that the church is locked after groups have left and allow us to open the church for groups without driving downtown. There will be a camera on the outside courtyard as well, which will provide information about how that space is used. Work on the security system will take place soon, and it will likely be finished before the doors are replaced.

We thank everyone who is working on and contributing to the care of our church.

Justice in Action

After months of meetings and extensive engagement with law enforcement and mental health professionals in the community, Justice in Action is winnowing down to two specific proposals that will be presented to community leaders in May. Under a governing board, with Fr. Robert serving as chair, dozens of volunteers have been researching elements of the proposals. Lucy



Webster, Mark Musick, Todd Sneller, Jeanine Jewell, Pippa Lawson and several other SMOC members have taken an active role in the research and evaluation process. Justice in Action's focus areas are mental health and criminal justice.

Mental Health -- As the research and discussions evolved, it became clear these are complex, interconnected areas of concern. The mental health issue, as outlined in a draft statement, notes that people experiencing mental health issues in Lancaster County are often unable to access timely and appropriate care and often end up interacting with the criminal justice system. This is a costly process, and it robs people of the opportunity to receive the ongoing care they need to lead productive lives. This situation is due to many factors, including inadequate treatment facilities, underserved members of the community, extensive waiting periods before care can be accessed, and too few mental health care workers.

Criminal Justice -- The criminal justice issue involves several components including the growing number of people with mental health and addiction issues being placed or kept in the Lancaster Jail. Many of the people placed in jail are there for non-violent offenses. Some of these offenses are the direct result of inadequate mental health crisis responses. The local mental health care and criminal justice system does not have sufficient tools, discretion, or community- based alternatives to address current needs.

Remedies to help address both issues are being drafted as part of the proposals that will be presented to local officials on May 4. On that day, at 6:30 pm, about 1,000 people will gather at the Lancaster County Event Center for a Lincoln Nehemiah Assembly. They will hear about the research findings and proposed remedies. With the support of the *Nehemiah Assembly*, Justice in Action will ask public officials to embrace these remedies which are designed to produce practical, positive improvements to the issues facing Lancaster County in the mental health and criminal justice systems.

You are strongly encouraged to attend the Nehemiah Assembly. It is an opportunity to better understand these issues and the role our faith communities can play in advocating changes that produce better outcomes in mental health care and criminal justice in Lancaster County.

August Adventure for Ross

Many of you are aware that Ross Mosier, who serves as our Administrative Assistant and Music Director, has been pursuing acceptance into a graduate program to continue his studies in music and piano. Following auditions at KU, Rutgers, Manhattan School of Music, and Salem College in NC, Ross received acceptance at KU. The relative closeness of Lawrence to Kansas City means Ross will not only be gaining top-notch instructors at KU, but he will be able to play with and accompany a range of different groups (as he has done here in Lincoln).

This is wonderful news for Ross! At the same time, it is a great loss for us at St. Mark's. Ross has not only brought beautiful music to our Sanctuary – both during service and through his promotion of our space for concerts and recitals - but has led the installation our audio/visual system, researched for a new and better security system, communicated with various vendors, and coordinated many other "instrumental" updates to the St. Mark's building operations.

Ross will be leaving St. Mark's in early August. The Personnel Committee met on Sunday, April 16, for a general discussion about hiring personnel for the Music Director and Administrative Assistant positions. Currently, Fr. Robert and the committee are reviewing and updating job descriptions, as well as looking at Ross's suggestions for these positions.

As the personnel committee moves forward, we will keep you updated.

A Note from the Office

St. Mark's has been busy as ever this Spring! Many recitals, rentals for events, etc.

Along with new doors and a new security system, we are also upgrading some of our tech and IT infrastructure.

Our Allo internet box and network switch will be moved into a secure closet with the new security system "brains." Our phone lines are a mess (likely original to the building) and those are getting redone as well! Network cables will now run in the ceiling instead of on the floor in the office. An additional Wi-Fi access point will be installed in the Undercroft where Justice in Action works.

Additionally, pending Vestry approval, we are getting a new copy



machine that will save the church a large amount of money, and be much more efficient for our printing needs! We are very excited about that!

In conjunction with Jeanine's info (above) about my upcoming Fall departure (more about that in the next issue of *The Roar*), the office hours will likely be changing somewhat, and you might see a new face at the desk (or hear a new voice over the phone) a couple of days a week. My colleague, Brent Shaw, will be helping sub for me a couple of days a week, for at least the month of May, while I start doing some piano tech work at the local piano shop. I will be helping rebuild the Omaha Symphony Steinway Model D, as well as likely do some work on Jackson Berkey's Steinway, wow!! Do not be afraid to ask Brent for assistance if he is in the office. I will still be handling all major things and I'll be in the office the other two days of the week. I'm here until August, so we have the whole summer to allow a graceful transition!


Kim Wins SMoC Golden Halo!
